Nomination Notice for Local Union 213 International Brotherhood of Teamsters Convention

(Las Vegas, June 14 to 18, 2026)

Nomination of candidates for 14 delegate(s) to the June 2026 International Brotherhood of Teamsters Convention in Las Vegas, NV, will be held on:

Date: Jan. 21, 2026 Time: 7 p.m.

Location: 490 E. Broadway, Vancouver, B.C.

The expenses of sending the delegates to the IBT Convention will be paid by the Local Union. The expenses of sending 4 alternate delegates will be paid by the Local Union.

Eligibility to Nominate

To be eligible to nominate or second, a member must have paid dues through December 2025. Dues and arrears must be paid by 5:00 p.m. on Jan. 21, 2026 at 490 E. Broadway, Vancouver, B.C.

Eligibility to Run

To be eligible to run for Convention delegate or alternate delegate, a member must:

- 1. Be a member in continuous good standing of the Local Union, with one's dues paid to the Local Union for a period of twenty-four (24) consecutive months prior to the month of nomination with no interruptions in active membership due to suspensions, expulsions, withdrawals, transfers or failure to pay fines or assessments;
- 2. Be employed at the craft within the jurisdiction of the Local Union for a period of twenty-four (24) consecutive months prior to the month of nomination; and
 - 3. Be otherwise eligible to serve if elected.

It is strongly recommended that each prospective nominee request advance verification of his/her eligibility to run for delegate or alternate delegate. In order to maximize the opportunity for the Election Supervisor to verify eligibility in advance of nomination, this request should be made in writing to the Election Supervisor as soon as possible, but in no event less than five (5) working days prior to the nomination meeting. The Election Supervisor will not be able to verify eligibility of any prospective nominee who requests verification less than five (5) working days prior to the nomination meeting.

Method of Nomination

Delegate candidates will be nominated and seconded separately from alternate delegate candidates.

All nominations for delegate and alternate delegate shall be at large. Any member may:

1. Be nominated and seconded orally from the floor by members in good standing other than the nominee; or,

- 2. Be nominated and seconded in writing by members in good standing, other than the nominee, unable to attend the nominations meeting. A written nomination or second must:
 - Be submitted to the Local Union Secretary-Treasurer so as to be received no later than 5:00 p.m. the day of the nominations meeting
 - · State whether it is a nomination or a second;
 - Identify the name of the person being nominated or seconded;
 - Identify if the nomination or second is for delegate or alternate delegate;
 - Be signed and have the last 4 digits of the member's Social Insurance Number; and,
 - Be treated by the presiding officer as if it had been made from the floor.
 - 3. Nominate or second more than one candidate;
 - 4. Be nominated or seconded by more than one member;
- 5. Decline to be nominated or seconded by a particular person or persons.

Any member who intends to nominate or second a candidate may also request that the Election Supervisor verify his/her eligibility. All such requests must be in writing and must be received by the Election Supervisor no less than five (5) days prior to the nomination meeting.

Acceptance of Nomination

The nominee may accept either:

- 1. In person at the meeting; or, if absent, in writing.
- 2. If acceptance is made in writing, the document must be presented to the presiding Local Union officer no later than the time the member is nominated. Any member present at the meeting may produce the written acceptance at the time the absent member is nominated.

No member may accept nomination for both delegate and alternate delegate. No member may accept nomination for both delegate and alternate delegate.

Any candidate for delegate and alternate delegate is permitted to run as a member of a slate, which is defined as any grouping by mutual consent of two or more candidates. To qualify on the election ballot as a slate, a slate declaration form, which is available from the Secretary-Treasurer or the Election Supervisor at the addresses shown below, must be completed and submitted to the Secretary-Treasurer, with a copy to the Election Supervisor, no later than three (3) days after the Local Union's final nominations meeting.

Any attempt by a person or entity to limit, interfere or retaliate against any IBT member for exercising the right to nominate, second or run as a delegate or alternate delegate, may result in disqualification of a candidate who benefits from the violation, imposition of criminal penalties under federal law and/or other consequences or remedy.

any Canadian steel companies are facing significant challenges when dealing with U.S. President Donald Trump's tariffs on steel imports. Construction continues to be busy with the many Community Benefit and Project Labour Agreement projects with the Provincial Government, LNG Canada, Site C, John Hart and Ladore Dam, along with the recently started Enbridge Aspen North. ith the news that LNG Canada has made its first shipment from the North Coast of B.C., it's time to reflect upon the contributions made by Teamsters 213 members to the historic project.

Teamsters Local Union 213 has had a heck of a run on the LNG Site over the past three to four years with multiple members gaining employment through various contractors who successfully were awarded contracts to perform work on the site during the project and who are still working up to this very day!

One of the biggest employers was Fluor Constructors Canada Limited (FCCL) where we had members employed from warehouse persons, truck drivers, flat deck drivers, fuel drivers and rock truck drivers. WSG/Servco is another signatory employer who secured a maintenance contract for the construction of the LNG

plant also employing multiple Teamsters throughout and currently. While the project was ongoing, we also managed to secure an agreement with the main LNG insulation company Altrad where we have members working and members are still being called out to work there.

With the news of the project's first produced gas from Train 1 this past June, followed by loading its first ship for market, we are now nearing the end of the construction for phase 1 of the LNG facility. Currently we still have members employed with FCCL working to finish off Train 2 with roughly 30 - 35 Teamsters members still employed between construction, commissioning and warehousing which we anticipate them winding down as Train 2 is completed.

As for Altrad Services, we currently have between 40 - 50 Teamsters members actively working, running the warehouse

operations and deliveries supporting Altrad's insulation union and painters union crews which will also begin to slow down just after the construction is completed on Train 2.

As for WSG/Servco and its maintenance contract, that will continue to the end of the project. WSG did however win an additional scope of civil work and final grade which also extended manpower on the site.

This project has been a great opportunity for our union and its members, with the added bonus of having new members included to be part of the training. That experience is invaluable to both the young workers and Teamsters 213.

As for the completed side of the project, Teamsters are also proud to be a part of the Pacific Regional Maintenance Council agreement with contractor Waiward Industrial on a five-year maintenance contract with LNG Canada. Our union is one of the trades involved in the work scope. We are also happy to report our local's success with organizing Kuehne & Nagel which is LNG Canada's main warehouse contractor, employing around 30 people. We began our first round of bargaining in mid-July.



o say Sysco foods has a reputation for being anti-union would be a significant understatement.

The American multinational food services company (which earned \$79 billion USD in 2024) has been repeatedly documented using tracking systems, mandatory anti-union messaging, dismissals and punitive hours reductions. That's not to mention its commitment to hiring union-busting consultants and using intimidation tactics during organizing or contract negotiations.

As you might imagine, Sysco's deeply anti-union culture and practices make it one helluva tough nut to crack when it comes to unionization. Here in B.C., Teamsters 213 organizers have been trying to make inroads with the company for decades. But even in the most promising moments, where it seemed like unionization might have been a possibility, swift crackdowns, threats and retaliation always seemed to win the day.

You could say Sysco has always been Teamsters 213's white whale. The union has hunted and hunted, and chased and chased. They just couldn't quite hook the big one.

But, unlike the hunter Ahab in Moby Dick, the Sysco story comes with a happy ending. Putting their dogged determination to the test, Teamsters 213 organizers were finally able to come home with the catch.

About one year ago, enough of Sysco's warehouse workers signed union cards to become Teamsters 213 members. Sysco drivers were soon to follow suit. All in all, it meant about 1,500 new Sysco members between Teamsters Local 213 and Teamsters Local 31.

"B.C. Teamsters have been trying to get Sysco and get into the food delivery system for a long time," said Teamsters 213 organizer Alex Bruse. "It was a massive accomplishment, years and years in the making."

According to Bruse, the organizing success with Sysco caused a wave of unionization throughout the food services industry. Sysco was the first domino to drop, and now workers with other companies want what unionized workers get: fair collective agreements, good pay and benefits, and strong representation.

"Sysco was a groundbreaking cert that changed the entire food services industry," said Bruse. "This was the step we needed that unlocked the Fort Knox of getting these food delivery companies. Getting Sysco as a flagship opened up doors for Teamsters in B.C. that had previously been slammed shut."

Bruse said, since organizing Sysco, Teamsters 213 has now brought on members from Pratt's Foods, both in the Lower Mainland and the Interior. Teamsters 31 has been able to organize Gordon's Foods.

Teamsters Local 213 Principal Officer Tony Santavenere credits 213's organizers for the monumental achievement with Sysco.

"The organizers work day and night. They're committed to their craft, 100 per cent," said Santavenere. "They work seven days a week, 24/7. All three of them will go through a brick wall to get a card signed."

And while Santavenere has high praise for his organizers, he and Bruse say these organizing drives might not have happened without one of the most important tools in a B.C. organizer's tool kit. And that is, card check.

CARD CHECK

Card check, also known as single-step certification, streamlines the unionization process for workers.

If 55 per cent or more of employees in a proposed bargaining unit sign union membership cards, the union is automatically certified by the BC Labour Relations Board.

The key element of card check is that it removes the requirement for a secret ballot vote, meaning anti-union employers lose their ability to pressure and threaten workers ahead of a unionization vote.

"On the Sysco organizing drive, without card check, they could've gone on the attack and tried to sway the vote, but that didn't happen." said Alex Bruse. "Since card check came in, I've never lost an application. Card check really put us over the hump."

The BC NDP government under Premier John Horgan and Labour Minister Harry Bains brought the card check system back in June 2022 with a Labour Relations Code amendment.

That policy marked the first change in 20 years. B.C. had previously used a two-step system which required cards to be signed and a vote to take place. Every union organizer knows that secret ballot votes can leave their organizing efforts vulnerable to company interference and intimidation.

"Card check has been a gamechanger," said Santavenere. "The NDP government really gave us a powerful tool to build the strength of our union and to build the labour movement as a whole."

The B.C. Ministry of Labour said the government continues to support the card check system as a means of labour organization.

"When a clear majority of workers have already indicated their support for a union, they should not have to go through multiple steps to restate that preference," read a statement sent by the Ministry.

"The single-step card check system has enhanced access to unionization and reduced the opportunity for employer interference in the certification process."

And while card check is clearly important, Alex Bruse maintained that it was leadership from Teamsters 213 Principal Officer Tony Santavenere that has allowed the local to be successful organizing, not only companies like Sysco, but others too. Those include Arrow Environmental, Kuehne + Nagel, Minibins, Linde Gas, Vitalair Canada and many more.

LAZER-FOCUSED ON ORGANIZING

While he's hesitant to take credit for the surge in organizing, Santavenere admits that he sees organizing as the lifeblood of the union. With new members, comes new life and sustainability for the organization.

"Organizing is the key to all unions' growth and strength in membership," said Santavenere. "I've been really focused on building and supporting our organizing department for the last six years."

Santavenere said, one of the best parts of being in a union is access to excellent health and welfare plans, as well as a good pension. Consistent surges in membership make those programs work.

"Your strength in numbers with your health and welfare plans,

your pension plans...the more people you get into those plans participating, the more you're able to make benefit improvements, which is great for all members," said Santavenere.

Bruse said leadership on the organizing file has been crucial to building Local 213's ranks.

"Tony has constantly pushed for more investments. He started the whole movement of 'organizing for power," he said. "He was vital behind the scenes. Without him, none of this would've happened. It takes that captain, that clear leadership from the top, for me to be able to do what I do, to bring in new members."

One of the big investments made by 213 is the Teamsters organizing trailer. It's a 30' trailer with a massive "Teamsters 213" and the Teamsters

horse emblazoned on the side. When that trailer pulls up to a worksite, you can be sure the employees, who are potential future members, take notice.

"The truck and trailer gets the brand out there. Without the brand, especially nowadays with the youth and the youth movement, you've got nothing. We've been able to revitalize the brand by doing this work," said Bruse

Both Santavenere and Bruse acknowledge that card check, a focus on organizing and the purchase of the organizing trailer have all played a role in recent organizing success, but both agree that, when it comes to organizing, the most important ingredient of all is relentless hard work.

"We never ever quit," said Bruse. "We had a goal which was to get Sysco. We kept it as a high priority and the local provided the resources to make it happen. That's what got us the results."

Over the years, he has worked on numerous major projects across British Columbia, including the boiler at Port Mellon Pulp, the natural gas distribution line from Langford into Victoria and West Saanich, the Inland Island Highway, the Nanaimo Parkway, the Southern Crossing Pipeline, the Ootsa Lake Spillway, the Kitimat Modernization Project, the Cabin Lake Pipeline near Fort Nelson, and most recently, the Coastal GasLink project for the past six to seven years. His dedication to the industry led him to serve as a Steward, a Safety Committee member and even a Foreman.

ummer of 2025 continues to be a transition period for work, as new projects start to ramp up and as we wait for the next round of projects to get going.

Construction projects like the Coastal GasLink (Shell LNG) Gas Plant continues to wind down and companies like Fluor, Waiward and Altrad are still working onsite.

A current driver's abstract is another important piece of information to have on hand. It is a requirement for dispatch as well as most employers. Registration forms were sent out in February 2025, please fill them out and return to dispatch as soon as possible. A new driver's abstract is required for the 2025 work year.

As some of you already know Local 213 has instituted a Code of Conduct for all members working on pipeline, heavy construction and roadbuilding projects. It is important that you sign and return them to the local as soon as possible.

As a reminder, all members who get laid off work must book back into the hall if they wish to be called for more work!

rtificial intelligence (AI) used to be reserved for the creepiest plot lines of science fiction movies. But now, it is very much an everyday reality. Once thought to be decades away from regular use, AI is now expanding and being adopted so quickly that it's becoming hard to gauge at what expense to human jobs and interactions.

Originally, robotics were a concern in our workplaces. I remember hearing, "robots could take over our jobs!". That doesn't seem to be as much of a concern anymore! Robotics can't think and they can't make decisions that the human can. Unlike robotics, AI can make decisions. It gathers information, implementing and executing what needs to be done. AI can be integrated with robotics and could lead to the replacement of humans. To say that thought is scary would be an understatement.

So, what can we do? Teamsters 213
Executive Board and Business Reps
recently attended an AI seminar. The
presenter, Hadrian Mertins-Kirkwood,
from the Canadian Centre for Policy
Alternatives (CCPA) spoke about the
many aspects of Artificial Intelligence
that we should be concerned about: is it
safe, ethical and regulated?

Mertins-Kirkwood showed us how AI has evolved. As an example, he compared an AI generated image of human hands from two years ago in what can only

be described as not accurate (too many fingers, disjointed etc.) and basically creepy. He compared it to a recent a video clip of an Al generated video ad that had Al generated actors. It was very convincing as the images were very lifelike. He went on to point out that the video clip was made in a very small amount of time for about \$500 and if this had been a production with real actors and production costs it would have probably been over \$10,000! Al in our workplaces is very real and will impact us

Currently, AI is not regulated in Canada, although, the Artificial Intelligence and Data Act (AIDA) Bill C-27, which aims to regulate AI applications at the federal level, is under legislative review. Workers should be demanding a say in their workplaces over how AI is implemented.

Al should complement workers, but not replace them. We need to strongly argue that Al should not be used to form the basis for worker constructive dismissal. Al needs regulation and oversight. Our collective agreements need to be proactive by incorporating language to protect workers from Al.

For example, AI performance monitoring should not be used to discipline a worker. There should be a requirement for humans to be in the loop for all decisions. Employers need to be transparent and consultation should be mandatory when it comes to all aspects of AI in our workplaces.

Workplaces will continue to change but it should not be at the expense of our workers and our livelihoods!



With the arrival of summer and the return of warmer weather, paving in the Okanagan is off to a strong start. Numerous smaller projects are currently underway across Kelowna, Kamloops, Beaverdell, Elkhart Lodge and Logan Lake.

On the construction front, several British Columbia Infrastructure Benefit (BCIB) projects are progressing steadily. The Ford Road to Tappen widening project is moving forward and just up the road in Sicamous, the Bruhn Bridge replacement is also underway. Recently, fellow Business Representative Ruvien Mahil and I visited the Jumping Creek to MacDonald site, as well as the Selkirk widening project, located just north of the recently completed Quartz Creek project near Golden.

I'm also proud to share that Members at Heidelberg Materials (formerly OK Ready Mix) in Kelowna, Penticton and Kamloops ratified a fair contract in April. After 94 days on strike, they are now back to work. I can't say enough about this incredible group. They stood strong and united from beginning to end, through difficult weather conditions including blustery days and temperatures as low as -17°C. My sincere thanks to Teamsters Local Union 213 for its unwavering support throughout the strike.

In other negotiations, members at Kelowna Ready Mix recently ratified a fair three-year agreement that includes wage and pension increases. I'm also currently actively bargaining with Korpack Cement Products in Trail.

I hope you and your loved ones enjoy a safe and healthy summer. I look forward to continuing our work together.
